


That's why we created this guide. Whatever drew you to TEFL in the first place – travel, personal growth, or making a living – salaries are going to play a big part in where you end up.

How we got our data

We analysed 500+ recent job listings in 60 countries, capturing monthly salaries, benefits, and qualifications.

We also tracked:


- Which jobs offered housing, airfare, and health insurance
- What qualifications were needed to teach English (e.g. a degree, TEFL certificate, and teaching experience)
- Insights from our network of TEFL teachers and graduates currently working around the world, giving you a better idea of what TEFL pay packages actually look like in practice.

Global TEFL salaries

Out of context, salary data can be misleading. For example, \$1,000 a month might not seem like much in Germany, but in Thailand, your money will go a lot further!

And when you factor in things like employee benefits (housing, flights, health insurance), the deal starts to look even better.

Below is a high-level view of TEFL pay around the world (remember – salary isn't everything!)

Pay isn't the whole story

No two TEFL jobs are the same – and neither are the salaries. But don't be too quick to write off parts of the world with lower pay. Regional differences in salary usually reflect a lower cost of living, too.

At a glance

Highest salaries: English-speaking countries, Middle East

You'll find the biggest paycheques in English-speaking countries (like the UK and Australia) and wealthy Gulf nations (like Qatar and Saudi Arabia). Some roles in these countries pay between \$4,000 – \$7,000 USD a month!

Mid-range salaries: East Asia and Western Europe

Countries in East Asia (like South Korea, Taiwan, and China) and parts of Western/Northern Europe (like Germany or the Netherlands) offer salaries between \$2,000 – \$3,500 USD a month.

Lower salaries: Southeast Asia, Latin America

Southern/Eastern Europe, Southeast Asia, and most of Latin America all tend to pay less – usually between \$500–\$1,500 USD. That said, the cost of living is often lower too, so your salary can go a long way.

Lowest salaries: Africa, South Asia

In a few countries – especially in parts of South Asia and Africa – TEFL salaries average under \$300 USD. These jobs are often volunteer-based or offer very limited income.



Tip:

If you're looking to save money, there are opportunities around the world – not just in wealthier countries.



One of the most diverse and in-demand regions for English teachers in the world, Asia is home to some of the highest (and lowest) paying TEFL jobs out there.

From teaching roles in high-tech megacities, to remote rural classrooms, Asia has some of the widest salary differences of any region.

We pulled data from hundreds of recent job postings to give you a true picture of what Asia has to offer, pay-wise.

Asia

An overview

There are clear differences in salaries across Asia, with pay patterns matching a country's level of wealth. However, a high salary isn't the whole story. In Asia particularly, differences in the local cost of living can make up for what seem like huge pay disparities on the surface.

In East and Southeast Asia, for example, it's common for jobs to include perks like free accommodation, flight reimbursement, and bonuses. So even if your base salary seems a little low, in real terms it might actually go a lot further.

By contrast, South Asian countries like the Philippines, India, and Sri Lanka usually have much lower salaries (or volunteer-only roles), and fewer benefits to make up for the shortfall in pay. Generally, people take these positions for the unique experiences they offer – not the paycheque.

Highest TEFL salaries in Asia (USD / month)

Countries like **Singapore**, **China** and **South Korea** are some of the most appealing destinations for TEFL teachers globally, with great salaries and tonnes of extra perks on top.

China, **Taiwan** and **South Korea**, in particular, have some of the best combinations of high wages, free accommodation, and paid flights anywhere in the world – pushing monthly salaries even further.

Tip:

Keep in mind that whatever country you're in, **cost of living will vary depending on the type of job you get** (e.g. a state school versus a private language school), and **whether you're based in a major city or a more rural area**.

TEFL teacher insights

South Korea



"For both public and private schools in Korea, flights and housing are typically covered. Most employers reimburse up to 1 million KRW [\$720/£540] for flights, some after three months, others include it in your first paycheque. Housing is usually a one room apartment provided by the school, and teachers are only responsible for utilities. Of course, it can vary slightly, but that's been the general standard I've seen here!"

Mid-range TEFL salaries in Asia

While popular Southeast Asian countries like **Thailand**, **Cambodia**, and **Vietnam** aren't at the top of the pay scale (salaries are between \$900–\$1,500 USD), the cost of living is usually a lot lower. So while you might not save a fortune, your money will go further – and you'll get an unforgettable experience in return.

TEFL budget tips

Paige Hanoi, Vietnam

What's your monthly salary?

53,000,000 VND per month, (~\$2000 / £1500) teaching grade 2 students*. School working day is 8-4:45, teaching 3 hours a day and the rest dedicated to admin/tutoring students.

*Total household income

What employment benefits do you get?

Basic health insurance.

What are your average monthly expenses for 2 people?

Rent and utilities: Rent varies between 300-800 USD per month depending on size/facilities etc. I'm fortunate enough to live with my boyfriend who is a teacher at one of the international schools in Hanoi, which does pay a rent allowance. Our rent allowance covers our monthly rent.

Food: Local meals out are 50,000-100,000 (2-3USD). Fruit and veg are cheap if bought at the markets, but supermarkets can be more expensive, especially for imported goods.

Transport: not covered. You can rent a motorbike for 1 million VND (~\$40 / £30) and fuel costs around 100,000 VND (\$3.80 / £2.90) a week.

Other: eating out in Western style restaurants will cost more (5-20 USD per meal), Vietnamese lessons 1 million VND (around \$40 / £30) a month.

Can you save money each month?

Yes, around 20 million VND/month (\$760 / £575) – but this could be a lot more!

Do you do any extra work outside your main job?

No, but a lot of people do second jobs tutoring or in private language centres in the evenings here.

Any local money-saving tips or budget hacks?

Local food spots (pho, bun cha etc) where the cost is only 1-2 USD is the best way to eat out and save money. We tend to eat out more than cook at home.

Jobs in South Asian countries like the **Philippines, India, Pakistan, and Sri Lanka** are consistently at the bottom of the pay scale. While paid TEFL positions do exist, many are unpaid or lower pay, and typically aimed at volunteers or gap-year teachers.

But don't rule out the South just yet. Despite the low wages, cost of living is also significantly lower. Rent in Islamabad, Pakistan's capital, is 92% cheaper than London. Manila, 79% cheaper, and Colombo (Sri Lanka's capital) 88% cheaper.¹

So while the average salary for TEFL teachers in South Asia might not seem like much, it's still possible to get by. Just don't expect to save a tonne of cash in the process!




Asia TEFL salaries & lifestyle


Asia is a diverse region with some of the biggest salary differences for TEFL teachers, so it depends what kind of lifestyle you're looking for.

Best countries for saving money

If you're focused on **saving money**, look to East Asia. **China, South Korea, Japan** and **Taiwan** offer great earning potential and generous benefits – especially for qualified TEFL teachers.

Best balance of salary and travel

If your goal is a **balance of cultural immersion or travel**, **Southeast Asia** could be a good fit. You'll earn less, but day-to-day life is more affordable, and cost of living is generally lower.

Best countries if you don't have experience

Based on our research, **China, Japan, South Korea, Vietnam** and **Thailand** tend to be more accessible for new teachers – as long as you have a degree. A TEFL certification isn't a deal-breaker for employers, but it definitely helps.



What you need to TEFL in Asia

To land paying TEFL jobs across Asia, almost all countries expect you to have a **bachelor's degree** and proper **TEFL certification**. (If you do have previous teaching experience, that's a bonus!)

Below is a quick breakdown of the requirements we found in our survey of hundreds of job postings across Asia.

Tip:

The only country outside of South Asia that **doesn't require a degree** to teach English is **Cambodia**.

All the others (like China, Japan, and South Korea) require a bachelor's degree to get a work visa.



Europe



Europe has some of the most popular TEFL destinations in the world. With a mix of great pay, benefits and travel opportunities – plus lots of people looking to learn English – the European TEFL market has consistently high demand (and pretty high entry standards, as a result).

From Bavaria to the Balearic Islands, we looked at hundreds of European TEFL job listings, giving you a full picture of teacher pay throughout the continent.

Europe

An overview

While most of Europe shares a common currency and economic area, there are still some big differences in pay and cost of living. TEFL jobs in Western and Northern Europe – like the Netherlands, Germany, and Scandinavia – had the highest salaries on average, while Eastern Europe had some of the lowest. (Cost of living followed a similar trend, too.)

Countries with the highest pay – like Norway and the Netherlands – have the highest cost of living (interestingly, the highest paying TEFL jobs also came with the most benefits). By contrast, countries with much lower salaries – like Greece, Türkiye, and most of Eastern Europe – are also generally much cheaper to live in, with many jobs in these countries offering benefits like accommodation and flights.

So if you're thinking about teaching English in Europe, keep in mind that salary isn't everything. How much of your salary you'll be spending on things like rent, food, and bills is also important, and so are the perks of your job.



Tip:

We found that many of the best paying TEFL jobs in Europe often came with the best benefits, too.

Norway and the **Netherlands** consistently had the **highest salaries** for listed TEFL jobs in Europe, with **Finland** following closely behind. However, these countries are quite difficult to find work in as an entry level teacher!

Norway and the **Netherlands** also have some of the **highest costs of living** of any TEFL country globally. This might not be much of a concern if you're trying to save and travel though, since the majority of TEFL jobs we looked at in these countries had great benefits, including housing, airfare, and health insurance.

Finland and **Germany** offer a **great balance of high pay and reasonable cost of living**, with Finland's benefits making it an even better deal. German TEFL jobs, by contrast, rarely included housing, travel, or health insurance in the listings we saw. (Germany is better for entry-level TEFL jobs though!)



TEFL budget tips

Diana The Netherlands

What's your monthly salary?

2,000 EUR (~\$2300 / £1750) for 3 days a week teaching in the Netherlands as an English for Academic Purposes teacher, to international students doing their foundation year before their bachelor's degrees.

What employment benefits do you get?

None. You need to have Dutch insurance to be able to work in NL. There is a health insurance allowance for individuals with low income. Insurance is around 150EUR, 100EUR of which can be reimbursed.

What are your average monthly expenses for 2 people?

Rent and utilities: around 750 EUR for a studio (\$865 / £650), 500 EUR for a room in a house with shared WC and kitchen (\$575 / \$435), or 1750 EUR for an apartment (\$2000 / £1500).

If you are over 21 and live on your own (in a studio or an apartment), and you have low income, you can apply for a rental allowance from the government.

Food: 700–800 EUR a month (~\$850 / £650)

Transport: 35–70EUR a month (~\$60 / £45). Plus, I bike everywhere, buying a second-hand bike is worth it, costs vary, can range between 50–200 EUR. Public transport (buses) is quite expensive. I have a train 'weekend vrij' (weekend

free) subscription that allows me to travel on weekends to any city in the Netherlands, for 35 EUR a month.

Can you save money each month?

Yes, between 900 – 1000 EUR / month (around \$1100 / £825).

Do you do any extra work outside your main job?

Yes, I work as a communications specialist, 2 days a week.

Any local money-saving tips or budget hacks?

- Some grocery stores have special fridges with discounted food that will expire in the next day or so.
- Every Saturday there is an open market in each Dutch town where local farmers sell bread, meat, fish, fruits, and veggies. They taste better and are slightly cheaper than the ones in grocery stores.
- Getting a weekend subscription for trains is definitely worth it, otherwise train tickets are insanely expensive. If I didn't have a weekend one, I would pay 60EUR for a two-way journey from Enschede (where I live) to Amsterdam, with the subscription I pay 35EUR, it lets me explore the country.

Mid-range TEFL salaries in Europe

TEFL jobs in Western, Central, and parts of Southern Europe offer a decent balance of pay to cost of living, with every country in this tier ranging from 'fair' to 'low' cost of living.

However, while pay for countries like **France** and **Austria** were high, and **Belgium** and **Italy** fairly high, perks were less common in the job listings we found.

In terms of qualifications, most of the job posts we reviewed looked for a minimum of a bachelor's degree, TEFL certificate, and a preference for some previous teaching



experience. However, **Portugal** stood out as more beginner-friendly for new TEFL graduates, with easier entry requirements, and listings for entry-level positions more common.

Tip:


If benefits are missing from job listings, it doesn't mean you can't find TEFL jobs with great perks in those countries. Job requirements and benefits change based on where you teach, who your employer is, and how qualified you are.

What's your monthly salary?

1,800 EUR (\$2075 / £1560) at a summer camp & 1,500 EUR (\$1730 / £1300) teaching in Italy.

What employment benefits do you get?

- Accommodation
- Flights (summer camp only)
- Health insurance

What are your average monthly expenses for 2 people?

Rent and utilities: 0, included

Food: included at summer camp, 30 EUR for single groceries trip in Italy (\$35 / £26)

Transport: Not Required

Can you save money each month?

Yes, around 1000 EUR / month. (\$1155 / £865)

Do you do any extra work outside your main job?

Yes, online 1:1 tutoring.

Any local money-saving tips or budget hacks?

- Try to eat and shop where the locals go!
- Have a separate account to put savings in on pay day.

As a group, **Spain, Greece, Russia** and parts of **Eastern Europe** made up the lower to mid-range TEFL salaries in Europe. Cost of living was also consistently much lower, meaning salaries tend to go further.

Perks like housing, flights, and health insurance were varied, with countries like **Greece, Russia** and the **Czech Republic** leading the way in terms of benefits.

Like most of Europe, employers were looking for a degree, TEFL certificate, and some teaching experience – though **Russia**, **Greece** and **Latvia** were more relaxed in their entry standards for new teachers.

The lowest TEFL salaries on the continent were typically found in parts of **Eastern Europe**, and in **Türkiye**. However, the cost of living in these countries is one of the lowest in Europe, and we found a good number of jobs with full benefits. If you're not having to worry about rent, flights, and health insurance, your salary will go a lot further (check out Matt and Perlie's budget breakdown below to see just how much you can make teaching English in **Türkiye**!)

Entry-level jobs were common in all these countries (except Bulgaria), but requirements for ESL teachers emphasized the need for a bachelor's degree and TEFL certificate, across the board.



TEFL budget tips

What's your monthly salary?

81,000 TL per month (~\$2000 / £1500)*
teaching kindergarten students.

We work from 8am – 4pm, teaching 4 hours a day with planning and taking students to other classes (drama, sports, music, art) for the rest of the day. You work with a partner teacher and split the lessons or time together.

- Health insurance


- Don't go to western style super markets as they're all imported from the UK and US for high prices.
- Street food and restaurants in Eminönü and Fatih neighborhoods offer cheap alternatives to Taksim and Beikta neighborhoods.
- Use your teacher ID card for discounts to museums and events.
- Uber can be cheap but watch out for scams...also the public transport in Istanbul is quite good!




Best balance of salary and travel

Europe is a great place to travel without spending a fortune, with some of the best transport links in the world. If you want culture

and travel without living on a shoestring, check out **Germany**, **Austria**, **Portugal**, **Spain**, **Greece**, the **Czech Republic**, **France**, **Belgium**, or **Italy**. (But wherever you go in Europe, you'll be able to travel and experience different cultures quite easily.).

Best countries if you don't have experience

If you're looking for your first TEFL job and want to prioritize accessible entry standards, try out **Latvia**, the **Czech Republic** or **Greece**.



What you need to TEFL in Europe

Requirements for TEFL teachers are surprisingly consistent in Europe, and entry standards are quite high. Most jobs will ask for a **degree** and a **TEFL certificate** – but double check individual job listings for specifics.

Tip:

While most employers in Europe prefer you to have a degree, it's not always needed to get a work visa (depending on the country). Because of this, applicants without a degree who have significant teaching experience are sometimes also eligible – particularly EU teachers who already have the right to work in other EU member countries.

English proficiency in Europe – particularly in the West, Scandinavia, and Baltic states – is excellent, so you'll need to do your homework if you want to land a job. If you already have a degree (and even better, a bit of teaching experience) the next step is to get your TEFL certificate!



TEFL in these two regions can be quite different. As a developing market, TEFL jobs in Africa are on the lower end of the global pay scale – but cost of living is very low too.

By contrast, the Middle East boasts some of the highest salaries for English teachers anywhere on the planet (and some of the best benefits, too). However, most high paying TEFL jobs in the Middle East require previous teaching experience (and maybe even a postgraduate degree!).

From Rabat to Riyadh, here's what you can expect for the pay, perks, and requirements throughout Africa and the Middle East.

Africa & Middle East

An overview

Two distinct regions, two very different TEFL markets. Africa has some of the lowest cost of living and salaries for TEFL teachers globally, while the Middle East – particularly the Gulf States – have some of the highest salaries in the world (even before factoring in the low cost of living).

If you're looking to make serious money teaching English, the Gulf is where it's at. Bahrain, Saudi Arabia, Qatar and Kuwait boast some of the most impressive TEFL salaries out there, with excellent benefits, and a surprisingly low cost of living.

By contrast, although African countries have a very low cost of living, benefits aren't consistent, and salaries are often very low. However, English teaching has a good level of demand in the region, and your experience will be like nowhere else on earth.

Tip:

Many gulf states salaries aren't subject to income tax. If you have the experience, you can make a lot of money as an English teacher in the Middle East!

The Gulf states – **Saudi Arabia** and **Qatar**, in particular – offer some of the most complete TEFL packages in the world. Great salaries, great benefits, and low living costs put the Middle East at the top of the list for new and experienced TEFL teachers alike. Cultural differences can take some getting used to, but if you're looking for a payday, the Gulf is one of the best places on planet earth to teach English, period.

Mid-range TEFL salaries in Africa & Middle East

Just like their Gulf neighbours, **Kuwait**, **Bahrain**, and the **United Arab Emirates** have consistently good employee benefits, including round trip flights, accommodation, and comprehensive health insurance. Though salaries weren't quite as high, the similarly low living costs mean your overall compensation still goes a long way.

South Africa and **Morocco** are both unique TEFL destinations, with some of the best natural and cultural landmarks in the world. Benefits were less consistent, but this could also reflect the limited number of job postings available at the time of our research – so don't be too quick to rule either country out.

Decent pay and globally low cost of living make South Africa and Morocco two of the most exciting but overlooked TEFL markets in the world.


Algeria, Egypt and **Tanzania** are developing markets, with a healthy demand for English language education, low living costs, and low salaries. Employee benefits were patchy, with some job listings including perks like accommodation and insurance – though flights were rare.

You probably won't grow your savings teaching English in these parts of Africa, but the range of entry level jobs, relaxed requirements, and minimal living costs are worth exploring if you want a different kind of TEFL experience to most people.



TEFL jobs in the Middle East often include flights and accommodation as part of the deal. When you throw in generous salaries and a low local living cost, you can start to see why so many TEFL teachers choose the Middle East to build their savings..

Best balance of salary and travel


South Africa and **Morocco** are good choices if you're looking to cover your bases from TEFL, while getting an opportunity to explore. However, it's hard to beat the **Gulf states** in terms of pay, perks, and cost of living.

Best countries if you don't have experience

Most employers expect you to have a degree and TEFL certificate as a minimum. As a general rule, listings in **South Africa, Tanzania, Egypt, Morocco**, and **Algeria** were more relaxed in their requirements – but it varies from one employer to another.

While it is possible to find jobs in the Middle East and Africa without teaching experience, entry level jobs aren't always the norm – and employers throughout the region expect you to have a degree and TEFL certificate as a minimum. An overview

Beyond a handful of countries, salaries in the Americas are lower than the rest of the world. The good news? South and Central America are also some of the cheapest places to live. And while you won't save much outside of Puerto Rico or Guatemala, demand for TEFL teachers is strong throughout the region, making it a great choice for teachers looking to gain experience.

Based on our findings, the highest salaries in the region were in Puerto Rico, Guatemala, and Costa Rica – though Colombia's low cost of living pushed it up the list.

On the lower end of the pay scale: Ecuador, El Salvador, and Peru – although every country (besides Mexico) had jobs listed with extra benefits. These often included housing and healthcare, but flights were much harder to find.

Highest TEFL salaries in Latin America (USD/ Month)

By quite a wide margin, **Puerto Rico** consistently offered higher salaries than anywhere else in the Americas. However, employer benefits were also less common, and the cost of living was also higher.

By contrast, **Guatemala** offered a great balance of pay, perks, and a low cost of living that made it one of the region's standouts. Don't expect to walk into a job, though. Most employers are looking for qualified teachers with a degree, TEFL certification, and previous teaching experience as a starting point.

Mid-range TEFL salaries in Latin America

Mid-table were some of the largest countries in South America, like **Brazil**, **Mexico**, and **Argentina**, as well as coastal **Chile** and the **Dominican Republic**.

Salaries in these countries were mostly the same, with a similarly low cost of living. Chile and the Dominican Republic had more job postings with listed benefits, but that doesn't mean you won't find them elsewhere, too.

Matt & Perlie Buenos Aires, Argentina

What's your monthly salary?

2,000 USD a month teaching around 30 hours a week online.

What employment benefits do you get?

None.

What are your average monthly expenses for 2 people?

Rent and utilities: We seek AirBNB long-term rentals to get discounts instead of paying a nightly rate. We found a very central location with a 1 bedroom, living room and kitchen apartment for \$700/month.

Food: Groceries are quite affordable with red meat actually cheaper than chicken (very surprising compared to other countries). We paid about \$50 a week for groceries. Eating out in Argentina focuses on meat and wine – about \$15 for a large steak and wine for one person.

Transport: Very cheap – metro and bus cost about \$0.50 a ride.

Other: Travel on weekends depends on where you're going but we stayed domestically. Flights within country about \$100–150 for roundtrips, and AirBnbs about \$50 a night.

Can you save money each month?

Yes, we saved about \$300/ month.

Do you do any extra work outside your main job?

No.

Any local money-saving tips or budget hacks?

- Uber is cheap but public transport is very reliable.
- Groceries are an affordable way to eat but eating out won't break the bank either.

TEFL jobs in **Ecuador**, **El Salvador**, and **Peru** were among some of the lowest-paid, not just in the Americas, but across the world. But don't let this put you off – cost of living is also some of the lowest in the world, and entry requirements for TEFL teachers tend to be more relaxed.

You'll still probably need at least a TEFL certificate to find work, but there were plenty of listings at the bottom end of the table that were open to new teachers – even those without a degree.





Best countries for saving money

Puerto Rico and **Guatemala** had the highest overall salaries in the region, but **Costa Rica** and **Colombia** might be worth looking at. Both countries have a low cost of living, and we found plenty of job postings with added benefits – like housing and health insurance.

Best balance of salary and travel

With its high salaries, low living costs, and proximity to North, South and Central America (and the Caribbean), **Puerto Rico** is our top choice if you're looking to travel comfortably.

Best countries if you don't have experience

Standards for TEFL jobs in the Americas are quite high, with employers in several countries asking for a degree, TEFL certificate, and previous experience – as well as basic Spanish speaking skills, in many cases. However, we found listings in **Peru**, **Chile**, **Argentina**, **Ecuador**, and others where prior experience wasn't essential.

Latin America is one of the best parts of the world to teach English if you don't have a degree. While most employers expect a TEFL certificate (at least 120 hours), job postings vary when it comes to previous experience – with many employers in the region open to hiring entry-level candidates.

And whether you see yourself in a classroom in San José or São Paulo, a TEFL certificate is the first step to getting there.



Working in an English-speaking country might not be the first thing that comes to mind when you think of TEFL, but there are tonnes of great teaching opportunities out there – as long as you have the right to work in one of these countries already.

From the UK to Australia, some of the highest TEFL salaries can be found in the English-speaking world. A lot of these jobs are geared towards helping new and existing immigrants work on their English. As a result, private language centres and 1-on-1 tutoring are some of the most common places to work.

Don't expect an easy way in, though – entry standards are consistently high, and competition

can be fierce. You'll generally need a minimum of a degree, 120 hours of TEFL certification, and previous teaching experience in most English-speaking countries to land a TEFL job.

An overview

Teaching English at home can be just as impactful as heading abroad. Across the English-speaking world, huge numbers of people need help learning the language, particularly in bigger cities.

With large immigrant and international student communities across the English-speaking world, TEFL-qualified teachers are in high demand. In the UK, nearly a million people don't speak English as their first language. In the US, almost one in ten speak English as a second language, and in Canada, one in four have a first language other than English.


While the bulk of TEFL roles are at private language schools or through one-on-one tutoring, it's also possible to find jobs in international schools, universities, or by volunteering with refugees and asylum-seekers.

Tip:

TEFL jobs in the English-speaking world are usually only open to teachers who already have the right to work in that country already. It's almost impossible to get a visa to teach English in many of these countries.


Australia and the UK boast some of the highest salaries for TEFL teachers in the English-speaking world – but wherever you go, salaries will be fairly high by global standards.


Tip:

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What makes a TEFL job worth it?

Yes, salary matters – but when it comes to teaching English abroad, it's **only one part of the equation**.

A well-paying job that doesn't suit your lifestyle, or costs more to start than you expected, might not be the best deal in the long run. And a lower-paid job in a cheaper place could offer you much more than just a paycheque!

When you're weighing up TEFL salaries, keep in mind:

- Whether perks like housing, flights, or health insurance are included
- How much you'll need to budget for visas, travel, and setting up abroad.
- What day-to-day living expenses look like in that country
